# Boatanchors and those who sink them.

o really stop a ship in a hurry, you take an old piece of klunky surplus electronics, tie a sturdy chain to it, then heave it overboard. So, sometimes distinctions are drawn between boat anchors and *boatanchors*.

The latter being any ancient piece of electronics whose shipping charges exceed its value. These remain quite popular. For hams, collectors, home labs on a super tight budget, or those who feel they "sure don't make 'em like they used to".

Or the "Iffen you cain't fix it with a Simpson 260, then it ain't worth fixin'" crowd. Or retired "for all the hours I slaved over that sucker" types.

Boatanchor enthusiasts often end up with exceptionally long arms.

Strangely, there's people out there that actually seek out the hum, noise, and distortion that vacuum tubes will invaribly use to trash otherwise clean audio. To others, something just don't seem right if a radio does not have its own internal dynamotor hissing and sparking and grinding away.

"Portable", of course, simply means that handles are provided. Preferably more than four. What better or more convenient way to burn your elbows than removing some stuck tube deep in the innards of your latest treasure? Such as those wonderful loctals after the socket spring corrodes shut.

Yeah, I've been there.

Some boatanchors might work just fine and keep running forever. Others may end up fairly simple and easy to repair Sadly, there often may be one key part that you flat out cannot get at any price. But, besides sheer bulk, the usual problem with older test gear is that it sort of works but keeps drifting on out of spec. Way out.

There's great heaping quantities of boatanchor info now on the web and elsewhere. Let's start off our survey of boatanchor treasures with this oldie but goodie...

The granddaddy of all boatanchor suppliers is still at their same old stall after all these years. I've gotten stuff from them for much longer than I care to remember.

One of my very first *money machine* ventures involved buying wierd mil surplus castings from them, adding walnut bases, and making them into decorator lamps.

Boatanchor items that Fair seemed to do well on included fighter aircraft command receivers. One of these in particular made a fine low cost if strip for homebrew ham receivers.
